It's the 30th Anniversary of the Maryknoll Affiliate Movement: 1991 – 2021!

When the first Affiliate Advisory Board met in September of 1991, little did they realize what they were about to launch. In 30 years, the Maryknoll Affiliate Movement has grown to more than 500 members around the world with more than 40 active chapters in the US, Latin American, Africa, and the Far East. Throughout our journey, there have been 10 MAC gatherings and scores of regional gatherings, not to mention the regular, often monthly gatherings

of faithful chapters all around the world. How does one celebrate this auspicious occasion: our 30th Anniversary?

We can celebrate the three decades of the Maryknoll Affiliate Movement in three phases: **past**, **present**, and **future**. The **past** invites us to reflect on those who have made this celebration possible—our founders, coordinators, board members, regional coordinators, and the many chapter founders and members. In the **present**, we express our gratitude to those who have gone before us, celebrate with all on the journey, and understand the significant events in the unfolding story of the Movement. Looking into the **future** may cause uncertainty and fear, but it can also fill us with dreams and visions. If we project the present into the future and nurture it with our spirituality, experiences, and new ideas, it will become our hope to meet the challenges of the 21st century.

This Anniversary provides us with an opportunity to create a new era of the Movement in a time of rapid and profound change—an opening to embrace future generations. GOOD BOOKS AND CONVERSATION

Maryknoll Affiliates and friends are discussing two Orbis books this winter: *Hunger for Hope* by Sr. Simone Campbell, and *Racial Justice* and the Catholic Church by Bryan N. Massingale. The virtual weekly gatherings started in February and will continue through March. Hugh Menton, Paula Schaffner, and Mary Ryan-Hotchkiss have organized the meetings of about 25 people from Oregon, New York, California, Washington, Illinois, Louisiana, and Florida, including formerly active Affiliates and friends from our congregations.

In *Hunger for Hope*, Sr. Simone Campbell stresses the importance of contemplation to maintain her constructive activism. Fr. Bryan Massingale's *Racial Justice and the Catholic Church* lays out the Church's complicity in racism and some Catholics' avoidance of working for racial justice. We are learning about our similarities and our individual experiences and issues, and our groups pray and reflect on our need for growth and understanding. We are building a community.

SHARING REFLECTIONS

Nancy McFarland – San Francisco/ Bay Area Chapter

love opportunities to join with other Affiliates in different programs. My husband Bob and I have been part of the San Francisco - Bay Area Maryknoll Affiliates Chapter from its start—about 22 years. We have had opportunities to work with the Maryknoll team in Bangkok with asylum seekers and later with the Asian Muslim Action Network, a Muslim peace organization, for three months a year for ten years. I would like to share some reflections from our Emmaus Community.

For 12 years, my husband, Bob and I have been part of the Emmaus Community, an intentional, inclusive Eucharistic community. Our daily meditations started at the first pandemic lockdown in March 2020, and many people outside the community have asked to be included in receiving the daily meditations. Many of us join early for our zoomed liturgies for a chance to talk with one another.

In his January 5th posting, David Carlson of the Emmaus Community quotes from *The Overstory* by Richard Powers: "Love is a tree with branches in forever with roots in eternity and a trunk nowhere at all." I love the part about how in nature (which includes humans), things work through cooperation and partnership, not through competition. My husband's photo conveys a similar feeling.

in the January 2nd posting, Carlson relates Dorothy Day's and Thomas Merton's statements to a New Normal:

"Everything that is, is holy, …" – Thomas Merton.

"The greatest challenge of the day is: how to bring about a revolution of the heart, a revolution which has to start with each one of us?" – Dorothy Day.

Carlson continues:

"Dorothy Day once said that her life's work was to make it easier for people to be good. Because from goodness comes love. And joy that accompanies love. She is putting values and the virtues that implement [them] out front. This would be a New Normal, wouldn't it? Putting values forward as our common goal in efforts to bring about a common good?"



"Dorothy Day and Thomas Merton were good friends. Both—one as a founder of alternative communities in the urban darkness and the other as a monk in the woods—were seeking common goals and values and a "new normal," including the normal that we are all other Christs."

It has been richly rewarding for Bob and me to participate in this community of activists.



EXPLORING FRATELLI TUTTI

Roxanne Hughes-Wheatland – Washington, DC / Baltimore Chapter

The Baltimore-Washington Maryknoll Affiliate chapter recently offered presentations on Pope Francis' most recent encyclical, *Fratelli Tutti*: *On Fraternity and Social Friendship*. Over 40 people registered for the two sessions held on January 23, and February 6, 2021. The sessions used the threepart See-Judge-Act method as outlined in a study guide produced by the Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns.

Susan Gunn, the director of the Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns, led the first session, focusing on chapters 1-4. The second discussion, addressing chapters 5-8, was led by Marie Dennis, a senior advisor to the secretary-general of Pax Christi International. Both presenters offered questions to consider in small groups, such as:

- What trends listed by Pope Francis resonate with you? How are we like a person in the story of the Good Samaritan? What new paths of hope have been revealed to you during the pandemic?
- What wisdom could Pope Francis offer to U.S. politicians? How do we understand nonviolence? Do you think the Catholic Church will recommit to the centrality of the Gospel Nonviolence?

One group noted that Pope Francis was writing the encyclical just as COVID was becoming a pandemic. The people discussed how they each were like a character in the Good Samaritan story, which Pope Francis used to illustrate his points. They identified with several of the trends Pope Francis mentioned: homelessness, migration, inter-racial issues, health, unemployment, global warming, etc. They agreed we all need collaboration to survive. One couple was planning to host a conference on Fratelli Tutti. Another committed to prayer in a small group.

Several individuals commented that two sessions were not enough to cover all of the rich information in the document. All are all encouraged to read the *Fratelli Tutti* thoughtfully and decide how we can incorporate the teachings as we interact with others.

Affiliate chapters could use a study guide in their meetings and further explore Pope Francis's insightful encyclical.





EASY MEETING: ON FRATELLI TUTTI

Format: Virtual (Zoom meeting)

This meeting is based on the six-page Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns' (MOGC) guide, "Pope Francis' *Fratelli Tutti: On Fraternity and Social Friendship.*" There are many other guides available on the internet; for example, the US conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has the two-page guide, "A QUICK KEY TO *Fratelli Tutti.*" (See the **Downloads** box on page 7.)

Before the meeting. Each person should have a copy of the MOGC guide available, especially if they can't easily switch between a ZOOM screen and an on-line pdf. Alternatively, the Zoom meeting host could screen-share pertinent parts of the guide. Use as many of the chapter introductions and reflection questions in the guide as your meeting time allows. Depending on the interest in your chapter, the MOGC guide could be used to explore *Fratelli Tutti* over several meetings.

Opening Prayer: Begin with the prayer from page 6 of the MOGC guide, "A Prayer to the Creator."

Read. Allow time for the participants to read silently the introduction and the text following Chapter 1, on page 2.

[In your sharing, using the **Mutual Invitation** approach—the facilitator starts the sharing, then invites the next person to speak, who then invites the next person, until all have spoken helps to build community among participants.]

Share. Ask participants to share any initial thoughts about their exploration of the encyclical. (Has anyone read the whole encyclical?)

Reflection question: How has the pandemic impacted you? Have you experienced a revived sense of **community**? How have you connected with the broader Affiliate or Maryknoll community?

In Chapter 2, Pope Francis says, "Each day we have to decide whether to be Good Samaritans or indifferent bystanders (69)." Our Maryknoll Affiliate **Spirituality** helps us be more than bystanders.

Reflection question: Have you ever experienced such an "encounter of mercy"?

In Chapter 4, Pope Francis says, "The true worth of the different countries of our world is measured by their ability to think not simply as a country but also as part of the larger human family (141)." The **Global Vision** of Maryknoll Affiliates stretches us beyond borders.

Reflection question: How do you feel called to cultivate a "heart open to the whole world"?

Discuss if your chapter wants to further explore Fratelli Tutti and if you want to take specific **Actions**.

Closing prayer: One person reads "A Prayer for Living "Fratelli Tutti," by Cameron Bellm, on this page.

FRATERNITY AND HEALING

Mary Ryan-Hotchkiss – Portland Chapter

The Maryknoll Affiliate Board's Engagement Team encouraged us to invite other chapters to our meetings. So, for our January evening meeting, the Portland Chapter invited western US chapters to Portland Affiliate <u>Evelyn Brush</u>'s presentation on Franciscans. Over 20 people from Washington, Oregon, California, and Montana responded to our invitation. When we introduced ourselves, many Affiliates shared their various mission efforts in Africa, South and Central America, and Southeast Asia.

Using PowerPoint slides, Evelyn provided an informative review of the various forms of Franciscans. The first and second orders are the priests and nuns. Third Order Franciscans, such as Evelyn, make no vows, but after a several-year orientation and formation period, they commit themselves for life. Fraternity is their charism. Third Order Franciscans feel responsible for each other. Many saints, popes, and other famous folks were Franciscans, including Christopher Columbus, Dante, Michelangelo, and Pope John XX111. Evelyn

pointed out St. Clare's strong role with Francis and in establishing the Poor Clares. She was not afraid to say, "No!" to St. Francis and to popes when she felt it was necessary. Evelyn presented the Rules that guide Third Order Franciscans and their wellknown stance for peace, nonviolence, and ecology.

After learning about the Franciscans, Affiliates

addressed the question, "How can we use our Maryknoll Affiliate Pillars of Spirituality, Global Vision, Community, and Action to heal the world?" Responses in the Chat function included:

- Teach empathy, experience JOY.
- We need to be the example we want to see.
- We need to share our stories.
- We need to be our best selves to those around us.
- The effects will ripple out.

North Bay/San Francisco Affiliate <u>Leslee Coady</u> said, "We can be more understanding, forgiving of people who think differently from us. Listen. Accept them as people. Not judging."

Anna Johnson, a Maryknoll Society (Fathers and Brothers) Mission Formation Manager in Seattle wrote, "By having the experience of walking with people on the margins of our global society, and being able to speak with radical inclusivity with people on the margins—too often these voices are left out of societal conversations and decisions."



<u>Marie Wren</u> offered, "Maryknoll Affiliates heal the world through *community*—sharing joy with each other especially in this time; through *spirituality* which underpins the *activity*; and through *global vision*. We are one human family going beyond borders, versus

St. Francis of Assisi had a profound impact on our Church and society. He created three distinct orders, including one for lay (secular) people. Franciscan spirituality has a unique perspective on the Incarnation, nonviolence, and the wonders of creation. the nationalism which is prevalent in some nations today."

<u>Manny Hotchkiss</u> said those in his breakout room talked about their volunteer work. <u>Kathy Culhane</u>'s chapter, North Bay/San Francisco worked on refugee housing, which covered all the pillars spirituality, global vision, community and action.

After the meeting, I reflected that Pope Francis's letter addressing fraternity, *Fratelli Tutti*, and even the Pope's name, show the influence St. Francis has had. What could we Affiliates learn from the Franciscans: Provide a better orientation? Build a stronger community? Like Affiliates, Third Order Franciscans have no set programs but rather show their charism in their secular community.

It was very good for Affiliates to come together, seeing some old friends and connecting with new ones. We had a few technical issues, but I learned to not plan too much activity and just let the Spirit flow.



THE ABC'S OF ACCOUNTABILITY FOR BLACK LIVES*

What white people can do to become active contributors towards justice.

Racism and violence against Black lives throughout our history is an abomination with painful and traumatic consequences beyond comprehension. The murders of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and Ahmaud Arbery have catapulted an uprising. Change must happen. We are long overdue.

A shift is happening: displays of solidarity, people listening in new ways, and racism being called out. These micro-steps are heartening, but it must not end there.

Confronting our long history of white supremacy and privilege is a process. We cannot just watch *Just Mercy*, say we are allies, use solidarity emojis, carry our signs, change our Facebook profile picture frames to Black Lives Matter, order our copy of *How to Be an Antiracist*, and call it a day. It requires a steadfast commitment to unlearning what we have been taught and acknowledging our accountability. In other words, no one is immune from responsibility.

In Feminist Accountability: Disrupting Violence and Transforming Power, Ann Russo emphasizes that seeing ourselves as allies or heroes just because we stand together in solidarity falls short. She explains that our traditional way of "punishing overt racist, sexist, homophobic, and/ or xenophobic words and actions" positions us to think that some of us are "good" and some are "bad," when really anyone who is white bears accountability.

Whether we choose it or not, being white brings privileges—and even when we don't want to benefit from systemic oppression, we do. While we all have inherited a fight we didn't start, we have a responsibility to use our privilege to help put an end to it.

Russo suggests that the lens of accountability helps us see the roots of oppression and violence as "operating on intimate, interpersonal, institutional, and systemic levels, rather than b e g i n n i n g a n d e n d i n g w i t h t h e individual." Behavior, then, can be seen as an "outcome of ongoing racial inequities, injustices, and abuses of power that are always/already operating in our lives." Behavior change doesn't come through fingerpointing and shame. Negative reinforcement is so 1950s. In 2020, we have a much deeper understanding of what can nurture and cultivate a process of honest reflection, unlearning, accountability, and change. We stop calling ourselves "good" and "bad" and instead get to work to dismantle injustice.

As an educator and therapist, I want to share some basics—the "ABCs" of what may help us deepen accountability. This list of evidence-based principles

that have helped me in my own understanding of privilege and accountability as a white cisgender woman is a starting point for the continued work of unlearning and relearning and commitment towards Black Lives Matter.

We can move from being passive bystanders to active contributors. Micro-steps are vital—we must keep walking, even when it's uncomfortable, confusing, exhausting, and painful. Accountability is a must.

DEAR AFFILIATES,

appy New Year to all Affiliates. I write today to propose gestures of restorative *justice* as the previous administration passes into our nation's history. I lament the many outrages and cruelties this administration has visited on various peoples. One of these groups is of course our Southern neighbor immigrants seeking asylum and refuge in the United States. We have all come to know about children separated from parents, deportations resulting in deaths, delay and denial of legitimate asylum requests. Furthermore, my experience has been one of insufficient outcry from Catholic and other Christian leaders. My distress about this experience leads me to donate the sum of the Covid relief check provided by the Federal

government to Maryknoll Sister Jane Buellesbach in Guatemala as a aesture of Restorative Justice. There are other donation opportunities as Maryknoll maintains a presence in El Salvador, at the U.S. Southern border, and elsewhere.



To those of us who may be in a position to do so, I urge consideration of passing along Covid relief benefits provided by the United States government as a gesture of amends for the sins of the previous administration and for American citizens complicit by their support of this president. Doing so would be one small gesture to join Maryknoll Sisters in making God's love visible after the failures of these past four years..



STUDY CIRCLES:


ADVANCING NONVIOLENCE
